RESOLVE TO CELEBRATE

The Lord answered, 'I am Jesus whom you are persecuting. But get up and stand on your feet; for I have appeared to you for this purpose, to appoint you to serve and testify to the things in which you have seen me and to those in which I will appear to you. I will rescue you from your people and from the Gentiles—to whom I am sending you to open their eyes so that they may turn from darkness to light and from the power of Satan to God, so that they may receive forgiveness of sins and a place among those who are sanctified by faith in me.' Acts 26:15-18

We begin the year 2020 in a strange way, with news of potential of serious conflict with the Middle East. The constant barrage of information from news networks for the most part is bad news, not good or encouraging. It can be a snowball effect that leads us to a loss of hope and to live in fear. In the midst of it all, we at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Oakland are preparing to observe a milestone in the congregation's life and the question arises in my mind: are we allowed to celebrate?

St. Paul's Episcopal Church, founded in downtown Oakland in 1871, has a long-established history in the Oakland community. It has been a place of spiritual gathering for many generations. While in its early days St. Paul's was known more as a church for the wealthy, over the years, the parish membership has evolved into a progressive and diverse urban community.

We believe in an acceptance of diverse Christian views, for the purpose of coming together to worship in community. Our parishioners presently include a mix of singles, families of

SAINT OF THE MONTH

Hilary, Bishop of Poitiers, 367

Hilary, Bishop of Poitiers, was a prolific writer on Scripture and doctrine, an orator, and a poet to whom some of the earliest Latin hymns have been attributed. Augustine called him "the illustrious doctor of the Churches." Jerome considered him "the trumpet of the Latins against the Arians."

Hilary was born in Poitiers in Gaul, about 315, into a pagan family of wealth and power. In his writings, he describes the stages of the spiritual journey that led him to the Christian faith. He was baptized when he was about thirty.

In 350, Hilary was made Bishop of Poitiers. Although he demurred, he was finally persuaded by the people's acclamations. He proved to be a bishop of skill and courage. His Orthodoxy was shown when, in 355, the Emperor Constantius ordered all bishops to sign a condemnation of Athanasius, under

pain of exile. Hilary wrote to Constantius, pleading for peace and unity. His plea accomplished nothing, and, when he dissociated himself from three Arian bishops in the West, Constantius ordered Julian (later surnamed the Apostate) to exile him to Phrygia. There he remained for three years, without complaining, writing scriptural commentaries and his principal work, *On the Trinity*.

Hilary was then invited by a party of "semi-Arians," who hoped for his support, to a Council at Seleucia in Asia, largely attended by Arians; but with remarkable courage, in the midst of a hostile gathering, Hilary defended the Council of Nicaea and the Trinity, giving no aid to the "semi-Arians." He wrote again to Constantius, offering to debate Saturninus, the Western bishop largely responsible for his exile. The Arians feared the results of such an encounter and persuaded Constantius to return Hilary to Poitiers.

In 360, Hilary was welcomed back to his see with great demonstrations of joy and affection. He continued his battle against Arianism, but he never neglected the needs of his people. Angry in controversy with heretical bishops, he was always a loving and compassionate pastor to his diocese. Among his disciples was Martin, later Bishop of Tours, whom Hilary encouraged in his endeavors to promote the monastic life.

O Lord our God, you raised up your servant Hilary to be a champion of the catholic faith: Keep us steadfast in that true faith which we professed at our baptism, that we may rejoice in having you for our Father, and may abide in your Son, in the fellowship of the Holy Spirit; who live and reign for ever and ever. Amen.



DIRECTOR OF YOUTH, CHILDREN'S MINISTRIES

The director will serve as the head Faith-Quest Teacher, volunteer coordinator, coordinate the chaplaincy services provided to St. Paul's School and will take other responsibilities as necessary in the daily operation of the parish in coordination with the Rector, Parish Administrator, and Bookkeeper.

The minister's work will be to support the volunteers, children, and families involved with the FaithQuest Program which meets weekly on Sunday Mornings from 10:00 am until approximately 11:00 am. The Minister will be in the classroom as the main Storyteller, Doorkeeper, or 3rd supporting adult as scheduled and needed.

The Director will also continue developing the youth program and events primarily focused on ages 13 to 17. She/He will be responsible for the recruitment and training of volunteers, planning, and organizing of youth events and meetings,

and communicating with the youth's parents about the programs and activities the youth will be involved in.

She/he will also coordinate with the current ministry team to ensure that the School needs (below) are met. It will be the expectation that the Coordinator will, in most cases, be the person giving the service, and if unable will call upon other clergy and lay leaders of the church to assist as needed. In filling the School's needs it will also be necessary to be in regular communication and coordination with the faculty, administrative and support staff of the school.

This is a full time non-ordained position.
