SPIRIT OF THE LIVING GOD, FALL FRESH ON ME

Hymn 115 of Lift Every Voice and Sing (LEVAS) is a one verse hymn in which these words are repeated three times. The only other words to the hvmn are: Melt

me, mold me, fill me, use me. We are entering the season of the church year that I like to refer to as 'Spirit time.' We begin the month of June with the feast of Pentecost and we remember how the promise Jesus made to his disciples comes to fruition and the Holy Spirit comes to dwell not only among but within them. This Spirit gives the disciples the power to preach and perform acts that they thought impossible for them and only within the realm of the power and authority of one Jesus of Nazareth. But this is actually what Jesus told them would be the case: Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained. (Jn. 20:22-23) He'd prepared them for this moment and time in which so that others may come to believe in they were to pick up his mantle and

journey forward in the transformation of the world.


Pentecost is also known as birthday of the Church. This is when the Good News of Salvation through Jesus started being preached and shared in earnest by the followers of The Way. This is when the disciples began fulfilling the great commission to preach to all nations and making new disciples. Even more importantly, this is when they stopped fearing. This is when the call of Jesus to not fear and not be afraid finally hits home. This is when they no longer care about what will be said about or what would be done to them. Their faith is now firmly grounded.

It has been quite a long time since that first Pentecost in Jerusalem and the Church has continued to thrive, prosper and grow because of the fearlessness of the disciples in each generation who, through the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, have shared their life testimonies

Wherever cultures meet, musical styles mingle, join, and evolve. Travel with us through Asia and the Middle East, through South and North America, and explore our planet's rich and varied choral cultures. Magen Solomon explains: "In this program of 'mixed marriages' we hear Eastern musical

styles, tone production, and harmonies meet those of the West; and witness unusual juxtapositions, like an American folksong as Renaissance polyphony, a Finnish setting of Spanish surrealist poetry. And the marriage of vocal melodies and harmonies with the rhythm of diverse percussion instruments. A whirlwind trip of musical styles, sounds and colors!"

Celebrated percussionist Peter Maund joins the choir for this unusual exploration. Described by the Glasgow Herald as "the most considerate and imaginative of percussionists," Maund will enrich the journey with hand drums such as doumbek, tambourine (riqq), frame drums, djembe, and other instruments, in realizations and improvisations of North African and Middle Eastern music, traditional European practices from Ireland, Turkey, and Bavaria, and folk traditions from Central African, South American, and South Asian cultures.

The Choral Artists, a cappella and together with Maund, will bring to audiences choral music in eight languages, drawing from the traditions of China, the Philippines, Korea, Japan, Finland, Eastern Europe, Africa, South America, and the Middle East. The music spans multiple centuries, and includes stunning works by Robin Estrada, Einojuhani Rautavaara, and Peter Schickele, and the premiere of new pieces by Jean Ahn, Elinor Armer, and Paul Chihara.
