KILLING MACHINES

The title may sound scary, and I would have to agree with such assessment. But, is it any scarier than what we have been witnessing in this country and around the world?

As we continue our lent journey towards Holy Week, Good Friday and the remembrance of Jesus' death, I have been thinking about the human ability to bring about death. I must admit that these thoughts are probably attributable to the shooting deaths of 17 people at Stoneman Douglas School in Florida, as well as the other shootings that have occurred over the last few years in the United States, as well as genocides and wars that continue around the world.

I constantly hear that humanity has made great progress in the technological fields. Our capabilities for doing and building bigger and more exciting marvels continues to grow and expand. Things that we considered dreams fifty years ago are becoming obsolete in 2018. We keep surprising ourselves with how quickly things are changing and moving forward.

I stop and ask myself: When is progress not progress but regress? I am taking particular focus on the fact that today



more than ever any lone individual has the highest possibility to kill great numbers of people in a very short time. Even when I take a look at biblical stories, I reflect on the fact that the martyrdoms we hear of were all orchestrated by large groups of people. When we hear of the Assyrian or Babylonian conquests, the many times of the fall of Jerusalem, Israel versus Egypt, they were not one killing many but rather a many-to-many scenario.

As a priest I have tried to think of ways to find biblical support for my perspective on the need to eliminate the current culture of guns and violence that we live in, but I've had to come to the realization that there is nothing to come from Jesus, his disciples or the older prophets regarding these incidents simply because there were no guns in

those times. However, as God's people in the world today we must continue discerning the ways in which God is speaking to us today to face our current circumstances and issues. This way in which we know God has been present though the examples of the Bible.

The reality is that violence in Holy Scriptures is very ambiguous, and it can be used to justify any position you wish to stand by. There are times when the Bible violence is unacceptable and others where it is mandated and sometimes even inflicted directly by God (the Flood, Sodom and Gomorrah, the Egyptian Army, to name a few). This said, I would invite our thought

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process to center on Jesus. You can probably infer from what I've written above, that I would ask the question What would Jesus do? However, I unequivocally offer the question What would a Christ-like response be to the current situation? Jesus calls us to love each other and care for the more vulnerable members of our community. He was willing to risk being in good standing with the politicians of his time to feed the hungry, heal the sick, restore the broken and even raise the dead. Now we each must ask ourselves: what am I willing to sacrifice to serve the vulnerable in my community?
